Congratulations to the **Moore** family, who celebrated their 200-year anniversary of farm ownership, spanning eight generations, at this year's Harrison County Fair. Ohio Department of Agriculture Assistant Director Howard Wise presented the family with an Ohio Bicentennial Farm certificate. Cottage Hill Farm is the largest ewe farm in the state, with 1,500 lambs produced from 950 ewes in 2015. The family cross breeds Merino, Dorset and Suffolk breeds to produce quality wool and meat, with nearly 10,000 pounds of wool sold each year. Stanley and son Rick received the Buckeye Master Shepherd Award (1989), and the family has received the Ohio Environmental Stewardship Award from the Ohio Sheep Improvement Association, the Conservation Farm Family Award (2010), Harrison County Conservation Farm of the Year award (2004), and was recognized by the American Sheep Industry for their environmental stewardship. *Photo courtesy of Farm and Dairy*.

Harold and Cathy Richardson and family were recognized at the 2016 Butler County Fair as owners of an Ohio Bicentennial Farm, established in Cathy's family in 1816. ODA Deputy Director John Schlichter (center) was on hand to congratulate the family. Their farm is 30 acres used for hay, corn and soybeans. The Richardsons also raise cattle and sell the calves to 4-H and FFA members. The Richardsons are involved in Farm Bureau and Pork Producers, and were 4-H advisors for 13 years. Their farm was part of the 2016 Friends of Ohio Barns tour, and the organization presented them with an award as owners of the oldest barn still used for agriculture in the county.
